1. Introduction

Raja Harpal Singh Mahavidyalaya Singramau Jaunpur, established in 1965, is situated on the highway (NH731) in between Jaunpur and Sultanpur. Distance from Jaunpur is 40 Km and distance from Sultanpur is 52 Km.It means in such a remote area we are providing the opportunity of quality education to the socially and economically weaker section of the society. The college is recognised by U G C under section 2(f) & 12(B). Initially, faculty of Arts (1965) established. We added Science (1972) B Ed (Permanent 1981), B. Com (2019) Postgraduation in Hindi, Geography (1993) & M Ed (1993), Sociology (2011), Political Science (2011), Chemistry (2018), Zoology (2018), Physics (2019), Botany (2019), Home Science (2023). Research facility is available in Hindi, English, Sanskrit, Geography, Economics Education. It has qualified and competent faculty, well equipped labs, Computer Lab and Libraries (Central, Departmental, offline &online), Sports ground, Indoor Stadium, Gymnasium, Multipurpose Hall, Common room for Girls. Campus is perfectly physically challenged friendly in all respects. We have eco - friendly campus with 30 KVA solar plant and water harvesting system. There are 55 teaching faculty. Out of them 43 are Ph D. We have ERP(MIS) & wi-fi enabled campus.

Curricular Aspects

Raja Harpal Singh Mahavidyalaya Singramau Jaunpur is affiliated with Veer Bahadur Singh Paranuchal University Jaunpur (U P) integrates its vision and mission according to the NEP2020. The institution offers 5UG,9PGand 15 Ph D programmes in Humanities, Science, Language and Teacher Education. Along with 6 cocurricular and 4 skill development courses, semester system have been introduced in the college. The college prepares its own academic calendar in accordance with university calendar. IQAC with the use of ICT provides strong support mechanism. For experiential and participative learning, we promote projects, educational tour, internship etc.

After first accreditation the college has introduced B. Com, Physical Education and Home Science at U G Level and Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany and Home Science at P G Level. All faculty members are proactively involved in university activities like- Board of Studies, Paper setting, and evaluation.

Recently, syllabus of all subjects at U G & P G level have been revised extensively to satisfy the need of the NEP 2020. Full Academic flexibility is being provided to the students through elective CBCS courses. Socially important issues like human values, professional ethics, gender sensitisation and environmental sustainability have been included in the curriculum and we organise extension programmes related to these topics on regular basis. Online and offline feedback system is available in the college. Soft copy of the admission brochure of the college, which contains all required information, is uploaded on the college website. We run add on courses like Yoga Instructor and Banking Assistant. All students of undergraduate opt these courses.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching- Learning and Evaluation

Diverse groups of students apply for admission. Admission is open and transparent. ERP based digital method is used for admission, Fee, attendance, reports and library. Total number of students is almost constant from 2019- 20 to 2022-23 range from 2272 to 2446 even in such an adverse situation. More than 60% female students are enrolled. Gender sensitisation movement, popularity of the institution, safety and security of the campus increased the enrolment of the female students from 53% (2021-22) to 62.83% (2023-24).

Under mentor- mentee scheme the teaching staff identify slow learners and pay special attention on them. The teachers prefer problem solving and participative approach to teach the students using ICT. To make the teaching more useful special emphasis is placed on practical teaching, Laboratory, educational tour etc. Workshops and seminars are organised to give them better exposure. The college provides academic and infrastructural facilities like- rich library enabled with digital facility, well equipped laboratories, Computers with internet facility and other ICT tools to make it more students centric. ICT is used at large scale in teaching, learning and evaluation management.

The college has 55 faculty members, out of them 44 are Ph. D. The teachers have been constantly doing efforts for individual and institutional excellence by attending national and international conferences, seminars, workshops, orientation, refresher and short-term training courses. Performance of the students is measured in the prescribed framework of the affiliating university. Programme outcome and course outcome are displayed on the website of the university and the same is pasted on the college website. Examination committee of the college manages internal assessment. Average pass percentage is more than 90% during assessment period.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution provides ample opportunity in the form of leave and permission to participate in research activities. Internet, online library and proper space for sitting with ICT facilities are being provided to the teaching staff. Promotional and developmental activities of research are maintained by principal, IQAC and

RAC of the college. As a result, 31 students took admission in Ph.D. programme including 4 teachers this year. IQAC organised seven days' workshop on research methodology in collaboration with UGC-HRDC JNV University Jodhpur in 2023. Faculty is proactively involved in developing E- content. Faculty members are actively involved in publishing research papers, Books and chapters in book. The college is an authorised centre for Pre-Ph D course work in Teacher Education department. The college has a good number of extension activities conducted by various departments and extra-curricular bodies like NSS, NCC, Sports and scouting. It includes community development, health & Hygiene, cleanliness awareness programme, Celebration of important days, government proposed programmes and students perform extension activities through NCC, N S S and Rovers Rangers. College invites experts and alumni to undertake extension activities.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Well developed infrastructural and learning resources are being maintained regularly. Physical facilities like buildings, play grounds, hostels help to run all the programmes smoothly. To optimise the use of resources the institutions has well designed master plan. During last three years college has renovated library and chemistry lab and constructed 8 rooms with the contribution of management. Sports ground was maintained during the same period. New toilet wing is constructed in the same period. Botanical garden is being developed by the botany department. Entire college in under CCTV surveillance. Fire safety system is also installed in the buildings. We have generators of 30 KVA and 65KVA along with Solar Plant of 30KVA capacity to overcome the outage of power supply. The college has 26 well equipped class rooms, 05 Labs, 01 computer lab, 01 Hall,01 indoor stadium, 01 girls' common room, library, and administrative building. The college has significant number of learning resources i.e. Desktops & Laptops with internet facility, LCDs, projectors, scanners, printers, smart boards are available in the departments and library. We have well equipped Gymnasium. We have rich library equipped with Library software (ERP) and N-List (INFLIBNET) which provides open access of books and journals. College website www.rhsmpgcollege.org is updated on regular basis to inform parents, students and alumni properly. Support services like bank, ATM, E-Suvidha Kendra and health centre are available within 800 meters. Statue of the beloved founder is well decorated and it gives positive energy to the learners. We have ramp at required places to help physically challenged students.

Student Support and Progression

The college publishes its prospectus on website to make the admission procedure fair and transparent. College ensures the provision of best quality inputs for smooth journey towards professional careers. More than 80% students get financial assistance from government. The institution supports the meritorious economically weaker students in its own style (Earn while Learn). The college inculcates entrepreneurial skill among students through soft skill workshop at college level and skill development courses. Through mentor-mentee scheme all departments guide students how can they crack NET/JRF test. More than 30 students qualified NET/JRF test during assessment period. We have very strong N C C unit. Students got selection in Agni Veer Yojna and Military and Para Military Forces in significant number. Students are given ample exposure to co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Enhancement of soft skills through workshops, seminars, guest lectures etc. The institution provides facilities to develop ICT skills and life skills like Yoga, physical health etc.

Although, the institution's environment is very friendly instead of that there are several cells and committees like grievance redressal cell, women anti- harassment cell and anti-ragging cell. All committees are displayed

on the website. Any problem of the students is addressed in win-win style and it takes minimum time. It is a matter of great respect for the institution that it has very proactive alumni association comprising number of academicians, administrative officers, bank officers, self-employed, businessmen and advocates etc as its members. Alumni association play active role in guiding the present students and other extension activities. Placement cell organised placement drive and more than 25 students got final selection. Some co-curricular Courses are included in the programme of undergraduate to enhance the numerical and psychological aptitude among the students which are very useful in competitive examinations. During last five years significant number of students participated and won medals in various sports activities organised at university, state and national level.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college has a very strong, confidential and open access system of feedback (online/offline). We collect, process and take action of the submitted feedbacks as soon as possible. Functioning of the college is as per the vision, mission and objectives of the college. We have a very proactive, visionary, creative and effective leadership in the form of manager of the committee of management. Governance is fully democratic and decentralised. From manager to support staff, all participate in decision making process as per nature of the work. Statutory bodies like Governing body (Committee of management), IQAC and CDC (Planning Board) all are constituted as per prescribed norms and are functional. Principal seeks the cooperation of all stakeholders as and when required. Heads, Coordinators, teaching faculty, students and Office staff extend their unconditional support to the principal. All other non- statutory bodies like college committees are constituted as per guidelines and functional. The college authority encourages faculty members to participate in faculty development programme, (online/offline) .Self appraisal forms are considered for assessment and career advancement. College development committee prepares and approves financial budget. Financial audit is conducted by internal and external agencies. Data collection and its management, of all academic and other activities, are the regular practice. Several programmes are organised for the benefits of students. During the assessment period the IQAC has focused on infrastructure, research, ICT and innovation. Most of the suggestions given by NAAC Peer Team have been incorporated in the system during last five years. IQAC has organised workshops on research methodology and other relevant issues.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

To fulfil the said vision and mission of the college, we maintain high level of generosity. We extend financial support to a large number of students who are pursuing his/her study in self -finance courses. The institution promotes gender equity and equality as a result enrolment of girl students increased significantly. Botany department maintains botanical garden and greenery in the campus. To make the campus environment friendly water harvesting system and solar plant are installed along with sufficient plantation C C, N S S and Rovers/Rangers unit organise sensitisation and awareness programmen on important issues and government's flagship scheme. The campus is Physically challenged friendly in all respects. We treat every student irrespective of caste, creed, religion, language and region.
